
Participatory Village Development Programme (PVDP) began its development journey in 1997 in District Tharparkar, founded by Mr. Dominic Stephen, who recognized the severe socio-economic and psychological challenges faced by the communities there. Registered on 15th June 1998 under the Societies Registration Act 1860 in Hyderabad with Registration Number 3830, PVDP's mission is to support poor and disadvantaged communities by encouraging self Help organization and mobilization for holistic social change. PVDP operates in some of the most challenging, poverty-stricken, and disaster-affected districts of Sindh Province, focusing on aiding the most vulnerable and marginalized populations. Since 1997, PVDP has been engaged in a Drought Mitigation Programme in District Tharparkar, supporting thousands of families to become drought resilient. In 2010, PVDP expanded its efforts to assist flood-affected communities in severely impacted districts of Sindh, including Khairpur, Thatta, Umerkot, Mirpurkhas, Badin, and Sanghar. PVDP has implemented various flood emergency response and Socio economic development and community empowerment projects with the support of partners such as Kindernothilfe (KNH). Catholic Relief Services (CRS), Christian Engineers in Development, Concern Worldwide, Church World Services (CWS) P/A, ICCO, Action Medeor, Misereor, Tearfund UK, Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC), Arche Nova Germany, Diakonie Katastrophenhilfe (DKH), WFP, Black Board Foundation Netherlands, and the International Rescue Committee (IRC). Our focus areas include Poverty Reduction, Drought Mitigation, Primary Healthcare, Primary Education, Community Empowerment (with a particular emphasis on women and youth), Disaster Risk Reduction, and Disaster Response. PVDP is governed by a Board of Directors comprising professionals from various development fields, with policies and decisions implemented by a competent management team led by the Executive Director. PVDP is registered with the Pakistan Center for Philanthropy (PCP) and the Sindh Charity Commission, and has an MOU with the Economic Affairs Division (EAD).

Strengthening Resilience Improving, Health, WASH and Food Security in UC Jhalori-1 Mirpurkhas Sindh, Pakistan.

July 2024 to april 2025

Overall Objective/Goals

The objective of this project was to improve the health, WASH, and food security conditions of 100 vulnerable households (approximately 700 individuals) in UC Jhalori-1, Mirpurkhas, by strengthening their resilience against external shocks such as poverty, floods, droughts, and climate change. The project aimed to empower Village Development Committees (VDCs) and local volunteers to actively participate in planning and implementing community initiatives, promote safe drinking water, sanitation, and hygiene practices, enhance food security through kitchen gardening, livestock management, and grain storage, and encourage women's participation and leadership in decision-making. By building community capacity and awareness, the project sought to ensure sustainable improvements in living conditions and long-term resilience for the targeted households.

Women Empowerment through Village Development Committee

My name is Shanti living in village Abdul Kareem Mehar, My husband whose name is Ganga Ram is a landless farmer. Our family depends on agriculture and livestock raising and despite laborious work by whole family we can hardly make the two ends meet. When PVDP established a project entitled Strengthening resilience Improving Health, WASH and Food Security they guided us to form village development committees in each village so that all beneficiaries work together for their own well-being through this project. I was elected general secretary of my VDC by the whole group of VDC members reposing trust and confidence in my ability to become responsible member of village development committee of my village. I was proud of myself and my husband who encouraged me to accept this post which women rarely get chosen to. PVDP team provided training to VDC members on how to run and manage the village development committee. I am happy to share that over 50% of our members are women of the same village. This a matter of appreciation and honor for all our female members of VDC. I earn the respect of male and elders who feel that women should come forward and play lead roles in social matters. They also recognize that women work hard to earn a living, raise children, do domestic chores such as cooking, fetching water, keeping the house clean and contributing to sanitation of the whole village. We fully take part in the implementation of the project in our village. We also celebrated some events such as VDC cluster Meeting, Women Day and Water Day Our village fully participated in these events in which I played the lead role. What I feel is that I am being recognized in my role as general secretary for my VDC and I am given the due respect and dignity by my community including the males and elders. I can rightly call this Women Empowerment for me and other women of my village.

Achievements (with figures)

5 VDCs (Village Development Committees) in all 5 Villages are formed and communicate with PVDP and other stakeholders, all 5 VDCs trained regarding management of their committee and how to function their organization. 7 Staff and 10 Volunteers have trained through TOTs on WASH, Food Security and Livelihoods, Kitchen Gardening and Women's Rights. People of all 5 villages have participated in Community Training on Kitchen Gardening, WASH and Food Security and Livelihoods, and their concepts were clear on different aspects of implemented training. Women Participation in different activities has been encouraged and increased as shown in participant details of different activities. 100 Households has developed Kitchen Gardening and 100 households were trained to use smokeless stoves. The representatives of Local authorities are aware of the high importance of activities on local level and participate in meetings with villagers, participation of local authorities and governmental institutions in the meetings are the indicators of that objective achieved. In the project area, 5 Village Development Committees (VDCs) were formed, with 67% women and 33% men elected through local community consensus. These VDCs have demonstrated proactive performance throughout the project timeline. Each VDC conducted regular meetings twice a month, where members collectively made decisions on various activities, including the selection of training participants for sessions held in the villages. The VDCs also facilitated collaboration among community members, particularly in supporting seasonal agricultural activities, ensuring mutual assistance and shared progress. The VDCs played a key role in encouraging women's participation in various initiatives, such as training sessions, refresher programs, VDC cluster meetings, cultural events, and annual day celebrations. This inclusive approach has strengthened community engagement and empowerment. 70% of the 100 households in the project area now use water filters for clean drinking water and latrines to prevent water- and hygiene-related diseases. They have also adopted energy-efficient, smokeless cookers, which improve health and reduce firewood consumption. These practices have significantly enhanced living conditions, health, and environmental sustainability in the community. At the end of the project, 60% of the 100 households reported that they had diversified their diets over the past year. This means they increased the variety of food groups consumed, such as by regularly eating vegetables, which contributes to better nutrition and health. This positive change was supported by PVDP Sindh, which organized a series of trainings and sessions across all five villages. These sessions focused on the importance of food security, good health, and basic nutrition, helping community members understand the value of a balanced diet and its impact on overall well-being. As a result, households adopted healthier eating habits, improving their nutritional status and quality of life.

Enhance the resilience of climate-affected vulnerable farming rural communities of Sindh province, focusing on improving their food security, livelihoods, and community organization in the face of natural shocks. Enhance resilience of climate-affected communities in Sindh. Improve food security and stabilize livelihoods. farming Build capacities of rural households to manage risks and respond to natural shocks.

Major Activities (July 2024 – June 2025)

Five rounds of **cash assistance** (PKR 17,000 per household, 460 HHs). Key Achievements:

Cash Assistance:

4 out of 5 rounds completed, reaching all 460 HHs each time.

463 goats distributed among 397 HHs.

Overall Objective/Goals

Restore safety and dignity for flood-affected people and ensure access to essential assistance, in line with Pakistan Flood Response Plan.

Major Activities:

Cash assistance:

PKR 17,000 per month for 2 months to 1,000 households.

Cash for Work (CFW):

Rehabilitation of 10 evacuation routes.

WASH: Installation of 30 new hand pumps, 500 bio-sand filters, rehabilitation of 2 water ponds, distribution of 1,000 hygiene kits.

Agriculture support:

Distribution of cotton and wheat seeds with fertilizer to 400 households, 750 households supported with kitchen gardening kits and seasonal seeds.

Livestock support:

Distribution of 600 goats to 300 households, 5 rounds of livestock vaccination.

Capacity building: 75 farmer field schools, 20 kitchen gardening sessions, 40 hygiene promotion sessions, 2 trainings on water infrastructure O&M, CBDRM training in 20 villages, one-month CLEW training (10 participants), 3-month vocational training for 45 youth (male & female).

Community structures: Formation of Village Development Committees (VDCs), complaint response mechanism in 20 villages.

Key Achievements:

Infrastructure: constructed evacuation routes in 10 villages.

Agriculture: 750 HHs received kitchen gardening seed; 400 HHs received cropping wheat seeds along with fertilizer.

Livestock: Conducted livestock vaccination campaigns covered 7000 animals.

Conducted Three months vocational Training course for 45 youth including the 30 men and women

CBDRM: Content developed and shared with donor; training planned.

Community mobilization: VDCs formed in 20 villages, Broad-Based Community Meetings held.

Total Beneficiaries:

Direct: 1,000 households (approx. 7,000 individuals, assuming 7 persons/HH). **Agriculture beneficiaries:** 400 HHs (cropping wheat seed/fertilizer), 750 HHs (kitchen gardening).

Livestock support: 300 HHs with goats.

WASH beneficiaries: 1,000 HHs hygiene kits, 500 HHs with bio-sand filters, 30 villages with hand pumps.

Training participants: 45 youth (vocational), 10 CLEWs, 20 villages with CBDRM.

Background:

PVDP Sindh in cooperation with Arche Nova, Action Medeor and Terra Tech responded to the floods in 2022 with provision of Food, Non-Food and hygiene Kits, after the Flood water has drained the rehabilitation of existing latrines and DRR Infrastructure in 11 Villages. In continuation this project with support of Arche Nova and Terra Tech rehabilitated the WASH Infrastructure in 9 Villages and School in 1 Village.

The rehabilitation project aimed to improve sanitation and education facilities in District Mirpurkhas, focusing on restoring latrines with hand pumps and one school to enhance community health and educational outcomes. The initiative was driven by the recognition of the critical need for improved sanitation infrastructure and access to education in the region.

Target Group:

This Project supports 10 Villages which were affected by Floods in 2022 in District Mirpurkhas. 9 Villages with the Rehabilitation of WASH Infrastructure and 1 Village with Rehabilitation of School. The beneficiaries are tenants of landlords, small scale farmers and small income laborers. This area previously supported by Arche Nova and Terra Tech in Floods 2022. Rehabilitation of 134 Latrines covers 134 families and 2 hand pumps covered 2 Villages with 100 Families, rehabilitation of school supported 84 children (47 Cirls and 41 Pour) in a Villages with 50 Families. rehabilitation of school supported 84 children (43 Girls and 41 Boys) in a Villages with 50 Families.

Project Implementation:

- Assessment and Planning: Conducted a thorough assessment of existing latrine conditions and the school's infrastructure to identify specific needs.
- Community Mobilization: Engaged local stakeholders and community members through meetings to gather input and foster support for the project.
- Rehabilitation Works:
- Latrines Repaired and upgraded 134 latrine facilities, including structural repairs, plumbing, and sanitation improvements.
- Hand Pumps Repaired 2 with Lead Pipe.

School: Construct Compound Wall, Earth raising, renovated classrooms,

improved access pathways, and upgraded sanitation facilities within the school.
Conduct Hygiene Promotion Session in School and discuss hygiene promotion practices in community meetings.



Lessons Learned:

- Community Engagement from the outset increases greater support and ownership of the project.
- Adjusting project timelines and strategies in response to unforeseen challenges is crucial for success.

Conclusion and Récommendations:

- The rehabilitation project for 136 WASH Infrastructure and 1 School has successfully met its objectives, contributing to improved sanitation and educational facilities in 10 Project Villages. The project not only enhanced infrastructure but also empowered the community through engagement and capacity building.
- Establish a maintenance plan for the latrines and school facilities to ensure sustainability.
- Continue providing hygiene and sanitation training to community members.
- Explore additional funding opportunities for further improvements in community infrastructure.

Linking Gender Equality and Resilience: Strengthening Vulnerable Groups in Rural Sindh, Pakistan Implementation Partner: Participatory Village Development Program (PVDP), Sindh

15th November 2024 - 31st December 2024

Target Union Councils:

UC Mir Khuda Bux UC Roshanabad

Project Overview

The project "Flood Relief and Rehabilitation for 125 Households" was designed and implemented in response to recurring flood events in 2020, 2022, and a severe flood-like situation in 2024 that devastated the lives and livelihoods of residents in Taluka Jhuddo, District Mirpurkhas. Under the Project Title: (Linking Gender Equality and Resilience: Strengthening Vulnerable Groups in Rural Sindh, Pakistan). The affected households suffered extensive damage to their homes, loss of livelihoods, destruction of water and sanitation infrastructure, and severe food insecurity.

The intervention, led by Participatory Village Development Program (PVDP), focused on both immediate humanitarian assistance and long-term community rehabilitation. The project was structured to ensure dignity, inclusiveness, and sustainability through gender-sensitive planning, meaningful community engagement, and locally driven solutions.

Project Objectives

Immediate Relief: Provide essential non-food, and winter items to 120 severely flood-affected households.

WASH and Shelter Support: Restore access to clean drinking water, sanitation facilities, and provide emergency shelter materials.

Livelihood Recovery: Support sustainable recovery through kitchen gardening, bio-sand water filters, and small-scale income-generation initiatives.

Community Capacity Building: Strengthen local knowledge and preparedness to cope with future climate-related disasters, especially among women and vulnerable groups.

Package included:

Plastic Sheet (12x12 ft), 1 Double Mosquito Net, 1 Mosquito Repellent Bottle, 2 Soaps, and 1 Jerry Can.

Outcome: Families reported improved protection from mosquitoes, better hygiene, and safer water storage practices.

Distribution of Winterized Kits

Winter relief kits were provided to 120 households, ensuring protection against cold weather.

Winterized Kit contents:

Warm Blankets, 1 Solar Torch, 1 Plastic Mat, and 1 Suit of Winter Clothing

Outcome: Families, especially children and the elderly, remain warm and safe during winter nights.

Distribution of Grain Storage Metal Bin:

Grain Storage Metal Bins were provided to 120 Households, ensuring the safety and security of Grains and ensure safety in rains and insects.

Outcome:

Families specially practicing the grain storage were selected and ensured their grains.

Distribution of Bio Sand Filters

120 Bio Sand Water Filters were installed at household level. Demonstrations on usage and maintenance were conducted with active participation from women.

Outcome: Families gained daily access to safe, clean drinking water, leading to a noticeable reduction in waterborne diseases.

Installation of 20 New Hand Pumps

Ten deep hand pumps were installed in flood-affected areas identified through community consultations. Each hand pump benefitted approximately 10-12 households.

Outcome: Improved water accessibility reduced the burden on women and children and minimized water collection time.



Kitchen Gardening Support

Kitchen gardening seed kits were distributed to 120 households, alongside training and guidance on soil preparation, seasonal planting, and maintenance.

Outcome: Households initiated homebased vegetable gardening, enhancing household food diversity and selfreliance.

Rehabilitation of WASH Infrastructure

PVDP supported the rehabilitation of water and sanitation infrastructure for 2 Ponds and 25 Hand Pumps and Latrines households, with special emphasis on hygiene promotion and safe waste disposal.

Outcome: Restored WASH facilities improved access to safe drinking water, hygiene, reduced open defecation, and ensured the dignity and privacy of families—particularly for women and girls.

Distribution of Latrine Base Materials

Construction support in the form of base material for latrines was provided to 120 households. Technical assistance and monitoring ensured effective utilization.

Outcome: Households began construction or improvement of household latrines, contributing to community-level sanitation improvements.



Community Engagement and Gender Inclusion

The project placed gender equality at its core, with women actively engaged in planning, mobilization, and feedback. Special sessions were held for mothers, adolescent girls, and elderly women on hygiene, nutrition, and filter use, boosting their confidence and role in community initiatives.

Additional Activities

Supported one Training with Bethak and a Need Assessment Study for BMZ.

Challenges Addressed

- Adjusted delivery routes for flood-prone terrain.
- Female staff ensured safe, respectful outreach.
- Local committees in UC Mir Khuda Bux and UC Roshanabad strengthened trust and coordination.

Conclusion

Reaching 120 vulnerable households, the project not only provided critical relief but also promoted resilience, dignity, and empowerment. By centering women and marginalized groups, PVDP demonstrated a sustainable, community-driven recovery model for Sindh and beyond.




Engagement with government

PVDP strengthened its collaboration with government departments at provincial and district levels, particularly in Sindh. The organization actively participated in coordination meetings with the Social Welfare Departments, District Authorities, and other line Department. PVDP also fulfilled the legal requirements required by the government. PVDP also shared project's progress and lessons learned with line departments to ensure alignment with government development priorities and policies. Regular interaction enhanced recognition of PVDP as a trusted partner in community development.

Donor linkages

PVDP maintained strong partnerships with its donor community, ensuring transparency, accountability, and effective delivery of project outcomes. Regular updates, review meetings, and joint field visits were organized with donor representatives. In addition, PVDP explored new funding opportunities and shared its success stories and learning with potential partners to strengthen future collaboration. The organization's credibility and consistent performance helped sustain donor confidence and attract interest for new initiatives in Sindh.



Organizational Structure and Governance

General Body

The General Body of the organization consists of 25 members. In the annual General Body meeting, important discussions take place regarding the organization's future, planning, policies, and the selection of Board Members. PVDP Core Management Team (PCMT)



Working Area



Mirpurkhas District:

Mirpurkhas is a fertile agricultural district, known for Sindhri mangoes and crops like cotton, sugarcane, and wheat. However, in recent years the effects of climate change are creating drought-like conditions in the area, adding to challenges of poverty, low income, and health and hygiene issues. Communities also remain vulnerable to floods during heavy rains. PVDP is working in Mirpurkhas on food security, livelihoods, WASH, health and hygiene awareness, disaster risk reduction, and resilience building to address these climate-related challenges.



Islamkot (District Tharparkar):

Islamkot lies in the Thar Desert where communities regularly face drought conditions. Most people live in villages and depend on livestock and rain-fed farming, which makes their lives highly vulnerable. Along with water scarcity, poverty, and weak health and education facilities are common challenges. PVDP is working in Islamkot on food security, livelihood support, kitchen gardening, climate change awareness, WASH (water, sanitation, and hygiene), and community trainings to help people cope with drought and improve their resilience.
